POLICY

To eliminate errors associated with confusing abbreviations, ISMP (The Institute of Safe Medical Practices) has published a list of unacceptable abbreviations.

These unacceptable abbreviations are not to be used anywhere in the hospital including both handwritten and electronic communication.

Unacceptable Abbreviations

IU International units MgSO₄ Magnesium sulfate

MS Morphine sulfate, Magnesium sulfate

MSO₄ Morphine sulfate

q.d., QD Daily, once a day, every day

q.o.d, QOD Every other day

u Units

TPA No longer considered an acceptable

abbreviation by stroke

Do not use trailing zeros. Example: must use "1" not "1.0" Must use leading zeros. Example: must use "0.1" not ".1"

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PROCEDURE

- 1. To avoid misinterpretation and improper usage of terms, the use of abbreviations is discouraged in all documentation.
- 2. When abbreviations are used, they must be decipherable and clearly meaningful in the context of the documentation.
- 3. If abbreviations from the unacceptable list are used in the writing of orders, the order will not be accepted and the documenter will be contacted to clarify the order.
- 4. If a chart reviewer encounters an unclear abbreviation, the documenter will be contacted to explain the abbreviation.
- 5. This policy also includes a reference list (attachment) as a guide to deciphering medical abbreviations. This list is not all inclusive.
- 6. Generally, standard measurements abbreviations, chemical symbols, obvious word shortenings and common symbols are acceptable unless otherwise specified.
